Church to Open New Missionary Training Center in Mexico

On January 29th, the Church made an official announcement that it would convert its high school in Mexico City (Benemérito de las Américas) into a new missionary training center (MTC) for Mexico. Church leaders report that the new MTC will house as many as 1,500 missionaries at a time and will not only service Mexican members serving missions within their own country but possibly all missionaries called on Spanish-speaking missions in Latin America and elsewhere in the world. The current Mexico City MTC appears to house no more than 200 missionaries at a time. The decision to repurpose the Church's high school into a MTC was

primarily motivated by a lack of space at the Provo MTC and other MTCs around the world to accommodate the recent surge in the worldwide missionary force.¹



Number of Wards in the Praia Cape Verde Stake Increases from Six to Eight

Organized in 2012, the Praia Cape Verde Stake recently had two new wards organized. Within the past couple years, the Church has experienced accelerated membership and congregational growth as convert baptisms have increased and convert retention has improved. Cape Verde recently became self-sufficient in staffing its full-time missionary force.

First Young Missionaries Assigned to Laos

In early February, missionaries serving in the Thailand Bangkok Mission reported that the first four young missionaries were assigned to Laos. The Church has had humanitarian senior missionary couples serve in Vientiane. to conduct humanitarian and Laos development work for many years and these couples have provided administrative support for the Church's sole branch in the country. Young missionaries assigned to Vientiane will primarily provide educational and humanitarian assistance under the Church's Deseret International Charities and will not openly proselyte. Missionaries report that young missionaries

will be permitted to provide ecclesiastical support to the branch but it remains unclear whether this includes teaching memberreferred investigators and baptizing converts. LDS apostle Elder Jeffrey R. Holland dedicated Laos missionary work in 2006. The Church do not have official status in the country.



First Missionaries Assigned to **Northern Ghana**

In early February, the Ghana Kumasi Mission assigned the first missionaries to serve in the predominantly Muslim north. Eight missionaries were assigned to Tamale, Ghana's third most populous city with over half a million inhabitants. Missionaries report that mission leaders began considering plans to open Tamale for missionary work over a year ago. The Church currently has no organized unit in Tamale and all eight missionaries will initially serve within the same group.

The Church may follow a pattern similar for opening Tamale as it opened Sunyani by organizing multiple to the groups prior creation of a branch. Approximatey 85% of the city population is Muslim but tolerance Christian proselytism and the ramafications of Muslims converting Christianity do appear major concerns.

Comparing Congregational and Membership Growth Trends in the LDS Church: 1950-2012

Congregational growth serves as one of the most accurate measurements for ascertaining membership growth in the LDS Church. Certain activity requirements must be met within specific geographical areas in order for church leaders to organize additional wards and branches such as sacrament meeting attendance, the number of priesthood holders who regularly attend church and follow basic LDS teachings, and the ratio of active priesthood holders to general LDS membership. Membership growth provides insight into the total number of baptized members but does not take into consideration the activity status and self-affiliation of members. This case study analyzes how congregational and membership growth trends have behaved over the past half century on a worldwide basis and over the past decade on a country-by-country basis.

Expanding LDS Outreach in Romania

At year-end 2012, the Church in Romania had a presence in 17 cities that altogether accounted for 23% of the national population of 21.8 million people. Notwithstanding a presence in over a dozen cities and congregations accessible to almost a quarter of the population, the Church in Romania remains extremely small. This case study reviews the history of the Church in Romania in regards to the expansion of mission outreach. Successes, opportunities, and challenges for expanding missionary work to additional locations is discussed. A comparative growth section compares and contracts the growth of the Church in Romania to the growth of the Church in other countries in the region and to other proselytizing Christians in Romania. Limitations of this case study are provided followed by the outlook for future growth.

LDS Outreach among the Mam of Guatemala

Estimated to number somewhere between half a million and 650,000, the Mam are a Mayan ethnic group that predominantly reside in western Guatemala. This case study examines the historical and cultural background of the Mam, reviews the history LDS proselytism efforts, and analyzes successes, opportunities, and challenges for church growth. A comparative growth section contrasts the growth of the LDS Church with other nontraditional proselytizing Christian faiths. Lastly, future prospects for growth are discussed.

Rapid Outreach Expansion in Papua New Guinea

Within the past decade, the LDS Church in Papua New Guinea has achieved some of the most rapid expansion of missionary activity and outreach in the world while maintaining high rates of convert retention. This case study reviews the history of LDS outreach expansion in Papua New Guinea and examines successes, opportunities, and challenges for establishing the Church in additional locations. A comparative growth section compares the outreach expansion of the LDS Church in Papua New Guinea to other proselytizing Christian groups in the country. Limitations to research findings and methodology are discussed. Lastly, future prospects for outreach expansion in the coming years are predicted and analyzed.

Recent Congregational Growth Trends in Nigeria

This case study reviews and analyzes congregational growth in Nigeria between year-end 2010 and year-end 2012. Trends in congregational growth since 1987 are examined followed by a detailed breakdown of congregational growth by stake and district in 2011 and 2012. Successes in achieving rapid congregational growth are discussed followed by an analysis of locations that did not achieve congregational growth during this period. A comparative growth section compares and contrasts LDS congregational growth in Nigeria with other Sub-Saharan African countries. Limitations of this case study are discussed. Lastly, a future prospects section provides an outlook for congregational growth for the foreseeable future.

Worldwide LDS Outreach Among Iranians

Iran is the world's 18th most populous country with 78.9 million inhabitants. Like many countries in the world, there are millions of Iranians who live abroad primarily in Asia, Europe, and North America. This case study reviews past LDS missionary efforts among Iranians worldwide and identifies successes, opportunities, and challenges for growth. A comparative growth section compares LDS outreach efforts among Iranians with other proselytizing groups. A future prospects section predicts the outlook for future LDS growth among Iranians worldwide.
