First Two Stakes Created in Cambodia

On May 25th, the Church organized its first two stakes in Cambodia. Two of the four member districts in Phnom Penh (Phnom Penh North and Phnom Penh South) became stakes, marking the first time in LDS history that the Church has created two stakes on the same day in a country that previously had no stakes organized. Prior to the organization of the new stakes, Cambodia was the country with the most members without a stake. Mission and area leaders have prepared membership for the

organization of stakes in Phnom Penh for approximately a decade, but convert retention and member activity problems have delayed the establishment of stakes for many years. With the organization of stakes, prospects appear favorable for mission leaders to

redistribute mission resources from leader and member support in Phnom Penh to expanding national outreach in areas outside of Phnom Penh where no LDS presence currently operates. There are now two stakes and three districts in Cambodia.

Stake Reinstated in Nigeria

On May 18th, the Church reinstated the Umuahia Nigeria Stake. One of only two stakes to have ever been discontinued in Africa, the Umuhaia Nigeria Stake operated from 1996 to 2005 when the stake divided into two districts based in Umuahia and Okpuala Ngwa. It is unclear why the original



stake was discontinued. The original Umuahia Nigeria Stake had five wards and two branches when it was organized in 1996 whereas today the area formerly covered by the original stake now has one stake, two districts, five wards, and 15 branches. There are now 23 stakes and 22 districts in Nigeria.

Third Branch Created in Burundi

The Church organized its third branch in Burundi on March 30th: the Bujumbura 3rd Branch. Rapid growth has occured in Burundi since the arrival of full-time missionaries in late 2010. The number of members has increased from 39 at year-end 2010 to 409 at year-end 2013. The Church



in Burundi organized its first two branches in 2011. Only African members serve full-time missions in Burundi. Currently Burundi is assigned to the Democratic Republic of the Congo Lubumbashi Mission.

Two Additional Cities Open to Missionary Work in Kosovo

The Adriatic South Mission recently opened two additional cities to missionary work in Kosovo, increasing the number of cities with an LDS presence from two to four. Steady growth has recently occurred in Kosovo as the Church organized its second branch in the country just last month in Gjakova.



Progress in Mozambique Increasing the Number of Members Serving Missions

Senior missionaries in Mozambique report that the mission has made a renewed effort for the Church's full-time missionary force to be self-sustaining as evidenced by increasing the number of Mozambicans serving missions to equal the number of missionaries assigned to serve in the country. Currently 39 local members are serving missions or have received mission calls, less than half the number of missionaires currently assigned to the country.



Tenth Stake Created in Italy

On May 11th, the Church organized its tenth stake in Italy from a consolidation of the Florence Italy and Rimini Italy Districts. The new stake has five wards and seven branches. The Church Italy has experienced significant growth in the number of stakes operating within the past decade as the number of stakes has increased from three in 2003 to 10 at present. The number of member districts has also fallen as a result of districts advancing

to stake status. During this same 10-year period, the number of districts has declined from 14 to one. The number of total congregations has also declined as church leaders have sought to create ward-sized branches. In 2003, there were 119 congregations whereas in May 2014 there were 102.



City Opens for Missionary Work in Benin

Missionaries serving in the Benin Cotonou Mission report that Porto Novo has recently had missionaries assigned and a member group organized. Porto Novo is the first city in Benin to have an LDS presence established outside of the greater Cotonou area. Missionaries report a high potential for growth in the Porto Novo area as many members have relocated to the city within recent years and there have been a substantial number of teaching referrals. Additionally, the Church recently organized its eleventh branch in the Cotonou Benin District.



LDS Church Obtains Government Recognition in Vietnam

Missionaries serving in the Phnom Cambodia Penh Mission report that the Vietnamese government has approved Church's the application for official recognition. The Church currently is only permitted to assign missionaries Vietnamese descent to Vietnam, where three branches operate in Hanoi (1) and Ho Chi Minh City (2). In a news release from May 30th, the Church reported that there are currently over 1,600 members in Vietnam; ² a substantial increase from the mere 100 members in the




country reported by the Church in 1997. Prospects appear favorable for the establishment of the Church in additional major cities where no official branches currently operate.

Missionaries Withdrawn from Two Cities in Ethiopia

Missionaries and members in Ethiopia report that a more conservative interpretation of the centers of strength policy has been recently implemented. This has resulted in the removal of full-time missionaries from two of the five cities in the country that used to have missionaries. The Church in Ethiopia has struggled to achieve greater "real growth" due to challenges for missionaries to proficiently teach and communicate in the Amharic language, limited resources and attention resulting from

Uganda Kampala Mission administering the country, rushed baptismal preparation, and problems with local leadership development. It is likely that limited progress will occur accelerating growth until greater numbers of Ethiopian members serve full-time misisons within their homeland.

Rapid Growth Continues in Cape Verde

Several church growth developments have recently occurred in Cape Verde, including the organization of the Church 's third stake, the creation of the first official branch on the island of Maio, and the Praia Cape Verde Stake growing from only six wards and two branches in 2012 to 10 wards and five branches at present. Annual membership growth rates have been approximately 16% for the past two years and annual congregational growth rates were 28% in 2012 and 35% in 2013. In 2014, four new official congregations have been created in the country.
